...and the Lord said let there be broadband

This could be the church with the fastest telecommunications in England, according to Goudhurst vicar Hugh Nelson.

The 12th century place of worship in Back Lane has just been put on the broadband super highway – enabling access to its rural residents.

At speeds of 1GB per second the local community can now use this service in their own homes because of the high tower's signal reception.

Without the building, service would have been virtually impossible to deliver, with telecom providers focusing on urban areas.

The Rev Nelson said: "On a clear day from the top of the tower it's been said you can see Canary Wharf in one direction and Hastings in the other.

"We struck a good partnership with Call Flow Solutions, a Kentbased telecoms company to get superfast broadband into villages."

To celebrate the link-up the whole congregation accessed the site through their phones and tablets during Sunday service.

"This is good news for local people," said Mr Nelson.

"It means we can now do things we never could before in the church, for example a christening we'll be having in October.

"The godfather is in Australia and won't be able to attend, but with Skype he'll have the opportunity to participate in real time.

"It also gives us the opportunity to screen live Sunday services, particularly for those who can't attend because they are ill."

He added: "St Mary's is a beautiful church with a long distinguished past and now it has communication facilities fit for the 21st century."

Local businessman and resident Lorne Mitchell said: "This is a wonderful collaboration between the church, and the local community. It will benefit everyone."
